

N this advanced age of the Automobile industry a prospective buyer not only tries the various cars on the market and consults owners of the different makes, but looks to the factory from which the car is produced to ascertain something of its organization and facilities for building a first-grade machine.

The following figures are mentioned to illustrate that the Buick Motor Co. ranks among the best in these respects and is one of the largest and most thoroughly equipped factories in the country.

The Company is capitalized at \$1,500,000, having plants at Jackson and Flint, Michigan, covering approximately 520,000 or little over half a million square feet of floor space. The demand for Buick cars being so great, it was found necessary to add another factory in Flint, having about 250,000 sq. ft. of floor space. The engine works have a capacity of 28 complete motors a day and the output of cars has increased, from 35 in 1904 and 750 in 1905-6, to an estimated production of 5,000 cars in 1907, including 3,500 two-cylinder and 1,500 four-cylinder.

This shows the growth of the organization during the past three years and determines conclusively that with these facilities only a first-class car can be produced.

Three Notable Victories



N November of 1904 we introduced the Buick car in the East by winning Eagle Rock Hill Climb in 2:18 2-5, cutting best previous record for two-cylinder cars in half and astonishing the automobile world by the power of our motor. That year, from October to December, sold two cars.

In 1905 won Mt. Washington Hill Climb, in 36:25 4-5, creating a new record for that event for two-cylinder cars and defeating cars of three times the price. For this "we have the medal." That year sold seventy-six cars.

In 1906, at Empire Track, Yonkers, won the 100 Mile Event, in 2:5—31 3-5, defeating a field of eleven high-powered French and American cars without a stop of the motor, demonstrating the great reliability of the Buick car. That year sold 256 cars.

Our victories during these three years have brought us **thirty-six cups** and medals Using Stock Cars Only, this shows the ability to-win on the track and hill in competition with the best products of two continents. We do not claim to have a racing car but believe we can do with two cylinders what others do with four and nothing but reliability and the best of workmanship with highest grade material could produce a car that would show these wonderful results.

KOEHLER'S BIG ORDER FOR 500 CARS




N October 1st, 1906, we as Buick agents in New York and New Jersey, entered into






